Stocks Go Well, Station Ready

Sometime in October or November, the first broadcast may be heard from the new Greece community FM radio station, WGRC. Committee workers are optimistic regarding the opening date, since response of residents to the call for support has resulted in raising more than \$2,000 locally.

Sale of stock in the station at \$1 per share has proved popular. On a door-to-door campaign Saturday, students sold \$150 in stock. Three student dances have been held to raise funds, and another is scheduled for 8 p.m. tomorrow at the Carter Park tennis courts, Long Pond Road. Music will be by the Maelstrom.

According to Jim Paris, student station manager, the enthusiasm of the students stems directly from the part

they are playing in bringing the new station into existence.

"There's great satisfaction in working for this station and helping to get it started--and not just having it handed to us on a silver platter," he said.

Paris said that although a federal grant of \$1,950 has been provided because of the educational benefits expected from this district project, the local contributions have now surpassed that and stand at about \$2,150.

The total funds available on hand, \$4,100, are more than enough for the initial costs of constructing the station facilities at Athena High School and more than half the total estimated sum needed to get the station on the air for this year--\$8,000.
